Reifel Bird Sanctuary: Look for and learn about birds and maybe even feed the ducks in Delta! Feeding the ducks in a long-standing popular activity for all ages, and Black-capped Chickadees will also take sunflower seeds from the hands of visitors. Registration required. Costs associated.

Fort Langley National Historic Site: Experience what life was like in the mid-1800s when you visit Fort Langley's historic site! Within its walls, you can find timber buildings, a blacksmith's workshop, a miniature farm, a schoolhouse, and more. Listen to Indigenous interpreters tell 100-year-old stories. The site is wheelchair accessible, and a paved pathway connects the buildings and historic grounds. Additionally, a rentable wheelchair is available for guests to use.
